Epic of Gilgamesh

A man created from the soil by gods.

The man lives "naturally" with animals

Tempted by a woman, receives food and covers his nakedness and is banned from his former realm.

A snake steals (Gilgamesh) immortality.

Eygptian Garden-Temple Ritual Ancient Egyptian Daily Ritual

The God Ptah (creator of man) was the first to create idols.

The Priest would go to the idol (image) touch its mouth with food and breathe into it each day to be reborn.

Gardens were temples that ordered the world around them. The bigger the garden and the more idols, the more powerful that temple was.

Comparative Myth

Epic of Gilgamesh

Epic of Gilgamesh

Gilgamesh search for Immortality after Enkidu dies

Searches for Utnapishtim who tells him "There is no permanence. Do we build a house to stand forever, do we seal a contract to hold for all time?.... When the Anunnaki, the judges, come together, and Mammetun the mother of destinies, together they decree the fates of men. Life and death they allot but the day of death they do not disclose."

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Epic of Gilgamesh

A Trial to stay awake

Utnapishtim tells him to seek a plant that can restore his youth

Gilgamesh finds the plant but while his guard is down resting a snake steals it forever.

"Bright-eyed" beautiful face

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

Scribes wrote and craftspeople produced goods.




Farmers, Servants, and Slaves


Carnivorous Man




